Galup VR Experience is a nine minute virtual reality film exploring the history and untold stories of Lake Monger in Perth, Western Australia. Galup invites audiences on a virtual tour of an iconic Perth wetland to share an important history obscured for nearly 200 years.

Galup VR Experience seeks to increase public awareness of a colonial massacre of Noongar people at the lake in 1830. It's an invitation to learn more about Australia's collective past and shed some light on the tragic events that occurred in and around Lake Monger, a nature reserve nestled in the heart of suburban Perth visited on a daily basis by hundreds of people that do not know its history.

This new VR film promises to be a profound experience which explores the transformative impact of truth-telling and brings people together for connection and healing. Understanding and acknowledging the past is the only way to reconcile and enable a better future.

Production was guided by a team of supportive Noongar Elders; Doolann-Leisha Eatts, Liz Hayden, Ted Wilkes and Glenda Kickett.

Galup VR Experience is an adaptation of an interactive site-specific performance created in 2019 by Ian Wilkes and Poppy van Oorde-Grainger with an oral history from Doolann-Leisha Eatts for International Art Space's Know Thy Neighbour project. The performance was remounted in 2021 for a sold-out month-long season at Perth Festival, co-produced by Same Drum and Performing Lines WA.

Galup VR Experience is Same Drum's first virtual reality film, produced and presented on Noongar boodja.

Galup VR Experience is:

- An immersive and intimate virtual reality experience that brings to life an important retelling of a largely unknown event in Indigenous and Australian history in suburban Perth.
- A profound immersive, visual and aural experience.
- A meaningful and necessary recording of a vital story in Indigenous and Australian local history.
- Provides an informative and engaging education experience.

- Noongar culture
- Massacre
- Impacts of settler colonialism
- Truth-telling

For millennia, Galup was a traditional Noongar camping and meeting place. The name Galup means place where the home fires burn. Today, thousands of people visit the lake and its iconic black swans without knowing the events that happened there or understanding the significance of this important site.

Galup VR Experience is an invitation to learn more about Australia's collective past as you sit with Doolann by her fire and hear about one of the first colonial massacres of Noongar people.

Noongar performer Ian Wilkes and his son Calven join Doolann to immerse you in this powerful retelling of history. As the rush-hour traffic passes by and the centuries slip away, they shed light on the tragic events that occurred in and around Galup in 1830, guiding audiences towards an immersive understanding of Noongar culture and the impacts of settler colonialism.

Ian Wilkes is a Noongar theatre-maker, dancer and performer. He directed Blue for Black Swan State Theatre and Djoondal for Perth Festival and has performed in Yirra Yaakin's Hecate and Ochre's Kwongan for Perth Festival, CO3's The Line at State Theatre WA and Honey Spot at the Sydney Opera House. Ian won the Perth NAIDOC award for Artist of the Year 2021 and was Perth Festival's Artistic Associate the following year. Ian is also a founding facilitator of Culture 2.0, Yirra Yaakin's regional youth engagement program.

Poppy van Oorde-Grainger (Writer / Director / Producer / Director of Photography / Editor)

Poppy van Oorde-Grainger is an artist, filmmaker and producer. She works across a range of mediums and specialises in collaborative work with social justice outcomes. Poppy has written, directed and produced projects for ABC, SBS and Nickelodeon and her short film Two Sands (2021) won first prize at Port Shorts and screened at several Academy-qualifying festivals. Poppy has worked on visual arts projects for London



International Festival of Theatre, Japan Media Arts Festival and Museum of Contemporary Art in Sydney and previously won the Fremantle Print Award and Australia Council Kirk Robson Award for young leaders in Community Cultural Development. She recently co-wrote and co-directed Ngaluk Waangkiny for Community Arts Network in partnership with ABC.

Doolann-Leisha Eatts

(Oral History Custodian / Performer / Birdiya Noongar Cultural Consultant)

Doolann-Leisha Eatts was a Whadjuk Bibbumen Noongar Elder and writer, storyteller and teacher of Noongar language. She was author of Our Country, My Nyungar Home and co-author of Australia Through Aboriginal Eyes and The Stories of the Aboriginal Urban Services. In 2011 Doolann was awarded the Torch-Bearers Medallion in recognition of 40 years of creating harmony within the northern suburbs among people of all nationalities and in 2015 she was inducted into the WA Women's Hall of Fame. She also received four NAIDOC Perth Awards including 2016 Female Elder of the Year. She was Vice-Chairperson of Aboriginal Urban Services and a member of the City of Perth Elders Advisory Committee.

Elizabeth Hayden (Birdiya Noongar Cultural Consultant)

Elizabeth Hayden is a Balladong Wilman woman of the Nyoongar Nation and an Elder who has been involved in the welfare of her people for many years as a State Advisory and a representative for Deaths in Custody and Police Aboriginal Relations. Elizabeth has a Bachelor of Social Work, a Bachelor of Arts, a degree in Media Culture and Creative Arts with a postgrad in that area; all from Curtin University. Elizabeth has worked in government and non-government services in the area of mental health for more than 25 years promoting and advocating the needs of Aboriginal mental health. Elizabeth is an advocate for the promotion and use of the Nyoongar language and loves every opportunity to promote it.

Ted Wilkes (Birdiya Noongar Cultural Consultant)

Ted Wilkes is a Noongar Elder who holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Social Science and his professional background includes working for the WA Museum, the Centre for Aboriginal Studies at the Curtin University of Technology, and sixteen years as the Director of the Derbarl Yerrigan Aboriginal Health Service in Perth. Previously, he was also Associate Professor at the National Drug Research Institute at Curtin University, Associate Professor at the Centre for Developmental Health at the Telethon Institute of Child Health, a member of the Australian National Advisory Council on Alcohol and Drugs and a member of the Australian National Council on Drugs and Chair of the National Indigenous Drug and Alcohol Committee. In 2014 Ted was made a Member of the Order of Australia 'for distinguished service to the Indigenous community as a leading researcher in the area of public health and welfare, to youth in Western Australia, and to the provision of legal support services' and in 2016 received the Australian Medical Association President's Award.

Glenda Kickett (Birdiya Noongar Cultural Consultant / Performer)

Glenda Kickett belongs to the Whadjuk and Ballardong peoples of the Bibbulumun Nyungah nation from the South West of Western Australia through both her mother and father's family lines. She is a social worker, having graduated from the University of Western Australia (UWA) in 1993; has a Master of Arts from Curtin University in Indigenous Research and Development; and a PhD in Social Work from UWA. Glenda is CEO of Karla Kurliny, Chairperson of NAIDOC Perth Inc., a member of the Noongar Family Safety Wellbeing Council, Co-Chair of Social Reinvestment WA and Chairperson of Shooting Stars, Glass Jar, Australia, education through netball.
